

A WORD FROM CHARLIE

 $m{F}_{ellowship}$ is a word used in churches and by Christians all the time.

- Two Christians chatting over a cup coffee say, "We enjoyed the fellowship."
- Christian High school athletes may belong to the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.
- A room at a church where members eat meals together is a fellowship hall.

All these are true and good uses of the word. After all, the word (in the Greek, *koinonia*) means to share something in common. But there is a deeper fellowship available to believers; it comes from working together and sharing our lives for the sake of the gospel. The



apostle Paul wrote to the Philippian believers, "I thank my God upon every remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine making request for you all with joy, for your fellowship in the gospel from the first day until now" (Phil. 1:3-5).

In the context, Paul was expressing gratitude for the financial gifts that the Philippian believers had shared with him from their very first acquaintance (4:15-18). But behind those gifts was a common desire to advance the gospel. Since not all could do that physically with Paul, the financial gifts were how they could share their lives with him as he continued his missionary work. We know this included their prayers for him also (1:19).

I have experienced this "fellowship in the gospel" from generous believers since the first days of GraceLife Ministries. These are people, maybe you, who want to see others experience the joy of having eternal life through the free gift of God in Jesus Christ. I am always humbled when people give and when they say, "I pray for you every day," or "My wife and I pray you every Sunday," or "We pray for you in our church prayer meeting."

What results from this fellowship in the gospel is that I feel a bond deeper than friendship. We are living, sacrificing, suffering, and rejoicing together to do God's work while we are here on earth. The icing on the cake is when we have an opportunity to visit face to face. We feel a mutual love and inner joy that is hard to explain.

I find it hard to put into words what your fellowship in the gospel means to me. I hope you feel my appreciation, love, and joy as we work together to advance the gospel of God's grace. And I do "thank my God upon every remembrance of you."






An Arizona priest, the Rev. Andres
